Dear Members,

Watermouth Yacht Club, your club, continues to struggle through these tough economic times and with a

generally aging membership — obviously I include myself — it is a concern for the future of the club.



As our members age they are deciding to give up their boating and therefore the club, and it appears that younger people are not taking up seafaring activities. It is my opinion that they prefer to experiment with many different pastimes rather than make the significant investment in a boat and who can blame them. The membership for 2014 is one of the lowest I can remember.

In addition there is the problem of geographics i.e. although Watermouth is located in one of the most beautiful locations, it requires transport to get there. Historically Watermouth YC has benefited from the fact that we had/have a number of members who do not live locally and when visiting, stay on their boats for the whole of the weekend and use the clubhouse. However, as the membership decreases and the costs of fuel rises, the numbers of these members and people frequenting the clubhouse are much reduced and therefore the bar population is at times pitiful.

Watermouth YC depends upon all of the members and I would like

to ask all of you to use the club bar, spend just a few pounds and it will make such a difference. Watermouth YC is non-profit making, so all the monies made go back into the club. Please consider attending the social events, 3 BBQs, a Quiz and a Pool night, plus a Buffet Supper and a Dinner with a ceilidh band. If we can increase the numbers at even just a couple of these events Watermouth YC can continue to be viable.

As an aside, the weather over the weekend of the 14/15th June was particularly glorious and many of the fishing fraternity were able to thoroughly enjoy the sunshine and their fishing. It also saw Wayfarer motor (no wind unfortunately) up to Lynmouth on the rising tide, evening meal in the Rising Sun and return with the outgoing tide to Watermouth – very civilised!

A Bit of History



This photograph was taken by my brother Brian in the late 1960's and shows Mr Billy Parkin inside the small stone building built into the cliff on the seaward side of Keith's office, (it fell into disrepair some years ago and was finally made safe when Keith pulled down the remains of the front wall about 3 years ago).

It wasn't Billy's home, of course, just a haven where he spent most days in his retirement with a fire going, the kettle on and chatting with visitors to his den.

I believe the building was originally a forge to do the metalwork when at least two wooden ketches were 'stretched' by cutting them in half and inserting a 'middle' section.

Billy's father had the magnificent name

Shakespeare Parkin; he had a brother Fred and a sister – more about her later. Some members may remember Billy's son, Peter Parkin, who in the 1970's lived with his wife and children in a good sized wooden boat moored high up at the top of the harbour beach, by Keith's office.

Like most of Combe Martin's menfolk, Billy spent many years at sea in a variety of roles and served in Minesweepers during the war – some, I am told, were converted to Paddle Steamers!

In later years Billy used to maintain and skipper an 18' clinker built open motor boat called Venture; it was built in the West Country and owned by Mr Follet, a former Combe Martin School Teacher who became a College Lecturer. He was also a published poet and married to Billy's sister.

Billy and Mr Follet used to enjoy fishing together in Venture, mainly in the evenings when conditions were suitable

How much do you value your life?

18 April 2014 the Police reported that one man died and another was hospitalised after their small fishing boat capsized in Bideford Bay.

At 11.30 BST, the conditions were set fair, 2 hours ebb on a spring tide with plenty of water in the main channel and a light NE (offshore) wind, ideal for a pleasant day fishing.

Two guys, in their 30's, out for the day with their dogs – and yet one of them died. What caused the boat to capsize has not been established yet, but it has been reported that they were not wearing lifejackets, they had no VHF radio, no flares or other safety equipment on board.

As yet there has not been an inquest so the final conclusion as to 'how' has not been made, as to the 'why', we will probably never know!



I see many of my friends and acquaintances, both fishermen and sailors, routinely row out to their boats and then leave Watermouth not wearing lifejackets.

Please reconsider.
