

The Lundy Boggit

I had never heard of this but Steve Barron assures me it is true and backed it up with a very old and tatty press cutting, which didn't copy very well, so I re-typed it.



Martin Coles Harman, (owner of Lundy between 1925 and 1954), was an enthusiastic naturalist who will be remembered especially for his part in the founding of the Lundy Field Society and for a number of attempts to increase Lundy's stock of wild animals. Many of these were unsuccessful, for instance, his efforts to introduce a herd of Red Deer which made a very rough landing and became very aggressive. After several attacks on visitors they were culled and, perhaps through inbreeding, the species dwindled to final extinction in 1962.

A pair of Rock Wallabies presented to Mr Harman in 1928 was perhaps a more ambitious introduction and everyone was pessimistic about their chances of survival, but indeed, these two creatures were responsible for the origin of the now famous Boggit, for it was from the first Wallabies that the Boggit evolved.

On their introduction to Lundy both Wallabies bounded away and were not sighted for a time. At the end of May in 1929, the body of one of the Wallabies was discovered in an old well and it was assumed that its' mate would not survive.

There were no more sightings until 1933 when, to everyone's astonishment, a visiting naturalist observed 3 on the eastern side of the island, close to the VC Quarry. Sceptics were promptly silenced by the discovery of a dead baby Wallaby near Brazen Ward and from then on, the Wallabies became a common feature of Lundy and their regular appearances are well recorded in the Lundy Field Society's records and Log books of that time.

Prior to the war, Professor I. E. Ballaw conducted a survey and study of the Lundy Wallabies and established there was a colony of nearly 20 frequenting the east side of the island which was more sheltered and provided cover and browsing areas. What was even more remarkable however, was that the Lundy Wallabies were slowly adapting to their environment. In a comparative study with Wallabies in Australia, the Lundy Wallabies were found to be smaller. Ears, legs and noses were all shorter and it was obvious that Lundy was developing a dwarf version of the Wallaby.

During the war years, little time could be devoted to the study of the Wallabies on Lundy and it was not until the early 1950s that Prof. Ballaw was able to return to the island for further research. He was astonished to find an acceleration of the development of the 'dwarf' Wallaby. Though he could only locate 9 Wallabies, they were becoming markedly different to those introduced to Lundy over 25 years ago. Unlike its ancestors, the Lundy Wallaby was now a short, stocky, thin legged species with long ears and a very pointed nose. Instead of being a middle sized member of the Kangaroo family, the Lundy variety was almost a midget. It had almost totally adapted to the peculiar environment of the east coast with its dense Rhododendron forests, low bracken, rocky crags, bogs and streams. Strangely, the Lundy Wallaby had also developed the habit of wallowing in the bogs

adjoining the small streams on this side of the island and for this reason was nicknamed 'Boggit' The name stuck and the animal has since always been known as the Lundy Boggit.

Nowadays, it is a shy retiring creature and the casual visitor would be extremely lucky to catch a glimpse of it. As more visitors came to the island, the Boggit only browsed in the early morning and late evening, also, cutting down the Rhododendrons has reduced its safe cover. It is rapidly becoming a rare and secretive animal, a nocturnal recluse.

It is thus not unusual that most sightings have been recorded near the Marisco Tavern late at night where the Boggit come to gather scraps to supplement its meagre diet.

Should you see a Boggit, please observe it carefully and do not attempt to approach it. Their bite is quite nasty and necessitates treatment on the mainland. Boggit hunting is banned on the island and, for this reason, all torches and nets will be confiscated on arrival if not handed in to the Warden.

- 4. Sat 12 September. Best specimen fish any fish excluding dog fish and mackerel. Entry fee £5.00 per person, book in at harbour office. Fishing from 10am to 6pm.

Having spent considerable time with the mast on tripods, down the side of the vacht club...rewired down the centre for the vhf, masthead tricolour, speed vane, deck lighting, wind steaming light...together with new standing rigging an all new halyards...it was lifted across with the crane and finally stepped into the tabernacle. Now once again resplendent as a "Macwester 27 Yacht", not the familiar "shrouded and covered hull" of what was the Macwester 27, known as "Cello" for the past somewhat 10 years!

Having taken on most of the rebuild and redesign myself...you will doubtless understand my sheer excitement at the mere possibility of "Cello...finally going afloat! So it was with great urgency and excitement that on my next visit to the harbour the



following week, I did manage to locate on board "a sail"...Oh yes...the genoa, the very same "red genoa" that was the mark of "Cello".

As it was midweek and not a lot of people around and the wind was gentle, I got onto the topsides and hanked on the head of the sail from inside the bag with a shackle. So with my left hand feeding the sail onto the foil of the roller reefing...and my right hand hauling the halyard aloft from the winch on the mast, the sail began to "peel out" of the bag and travel skywards.

AS THE SAIL PEELED OUT OF THE BAG.....there was a sudden realisation...THE SAIL WAS GETTING NARROWER! OOPS!... "ITS HANKED ON...UPSIDEDOWN...! So...with this realisation, and a quick look around, the halyard in the right hand was "dropped" and both hands were employed to bring the Genoa to a very unceremoniously...zip to the deck. PHEW, (good job no one was around on that occasion!)

Having found the "head" of the sail...finally...I proceeded to feed it onto the foil once more. Again using the right hand to haul it aloft on the halyard.

In what seemed..."no time at all"...the rather smug feeling of "cracking the problem" and getting the Genoa to fill in its right configuration... The silence around me was broken, from the stern end of Cello and out of sight below...a voice was heard to comment..."I SEE YOU HAVE GOT THE GENOA ON THE RIGHT WAY UP...THIS TIME"!

Oh yes...be assured folks, the CCTV we have in the harbour really is most useful.
