### Treasurer's Report

What a difference a little sunshine makes! A few days of good weather and boats are being launched, people are sporting sun tans and shorts; could this be the start of the summer we've all been waiting for?

Club financial activity so far this year has been routine with the exception of having to relinquish our Community Amateur Sports Club (CASC) status. Unfortunately, the CASC qualification criteria were amended within the April 2015 budget and we, in common with many other yacht clubs, were not able to satisfy the new requirements which came into force this year. However, whilst we have lost the ability to recover Gift Aid, we do now qualify for Small Business Rate Relief which exceeds the rate relief applicable to a CASC. At the moment, the overall effect of these changes is probably revenue neutral but the future situation with Small Business Rate Relief is one which may change. ### Wild Thyme Flooded!

John and Wendy Culley flew out from Gatwick on the 15th May to commence their 4th season of sailing and exploring the Ionian Seas and Islands. Arriving at Preveza airport, then collecting their arranged hire car before driving 2km to the Ionian Marine boatyard across the water from the Port of Preveza.

We had already arranged with the yard that a ladder would be in place to access Wild Thyme as she is a Fin Keeled Westerly Falcon 34 drawing 1.5m (5') so when ashore in her cradle it is a good climb to reach the cockpit. Everything looked fine, we had left her as always with her fitted cockpit tent in place, to keep out the wind borne Sahara sands that find their way in everywhere in the Spring.



We had also as is the norm shut down and isolated all electrics and mounted solar panels, and securely bunged all outlets/openings to prevent wasps getting in and building nests, which they are prone to do.

So up the ladder goes Wendy to open up the main hatch whilst I unload our 5 bags/cases.

Then I hear an anguished cry, and Wendy calls down in a very shocked manner that "We have a very serious problem.

Climbing up to join her and see what seems to be the problem, I was shocked to find the interior of Wild Thyme was flooded completely almost up to bunk level, and the water looked black and oily, and the floorboards were seen to be floating.

Took a while to gather our thoughts, then thought I must try to get some water pumped out, only the manual bilge pump was usable so we set to work for several hours, and also rigged up two hoses siphoning water. It took at least 4 hours to see any perceptible change in level. I just wanted to get the water level down sufficiently to be able to enter and get a closer look and take photographs. Eventually we achieved this, but I found I was not able to take any photos yet as the lens immediately fogged up on entering the cabin. We managed to get some hatches open and the air cleared a little enabling some photos.











We could then see that we had an absolute disaster on our hands and my initial thoughts were that Wild Thyme was "written off", at which stage I thought I had better contact my insurance company. I also contacted the surveyor who had done our initial survey and who lives on a Westerly Yacht in nearby Lefkas Marina. And he kindly came across and confirmed my initial thoughts that we may indeed be looking at a write off. But with the boat still half full of water and floating debris it was too early to properly assess, wait until we hear from our insurers, as they may appoint him. Fortunately we have a good insurance policy with Navigators and General "Westerly Owners, scheme, and following an email they responded next morning that they had appointed an independent surveyor and he was an Athens based Greek Surveyor who was travelling from Athens to be with us the next day. I was initially filled with dread at what would turn up but could not have been more wrong.

Next morning bang on the arranged time appears Costas (Mr Constantine Vassilos Markopouliotis) and what a lovely guy. Excellent English as he trained as a Naval Architect at Newcastle University, and married to an Irish girl, and boy does he know his stuff, he has a Moody 40 himself and turns out is a friend of an acquaintance from Malta whom we met via our friends John and Carol Boulter, which very much gave us a head start in getting along. A quite extended mutual friendship but by golly it paid dividends to have that little bit extra in a relationship.

He very quickly arranged for a team of contractors from Lefkas to call on the Monday morning and to begin emptying the yacht, and I do mean empty, not just the remaining water but EVERYTHING ABOARD, and there is a lot of it.

We inherited a very well stocked and equipped boat from the previous owners who had her for 9 years, and as is my way, I quickly started adding equipment and spares, over the next three years.

The plan was to bring in a shipping container and plonk it as near to Wild Thyme as we could but alas, all the spare shipping containers in Greece have been taken and are in use providing emergency refugee accommodation, one was located in Athens at a high cost, and the insurers were going for it. But I approached the yard management who by now were very aware of the situation, and they offered the use of a large lockable steel storage shed at a very reasonable cost.

I was surprised later to hear comments from other boat owners who just assumed that the boatyard would be unhelpful. How wrong those folk are, it's all a question of approach I must say that we have generally found the local Greek people of the Ionian region to be very generous and hospitable, particularly toward the English, (just glad we are not German).

After the bulk of the water had been evacuated we set about clearing out Wildthyme, it took myself and Wendy 2 days then another day with the help of 4 guys the contractor sent. It was very depressing to see our belongings in that state, much of it was immediately binned, everything else placed on pallets for removal by forklift to our store.

We of course became homeless, but our friends John and Carol offered us accommodation aboard "Aquatint" their Westerly Corsair 36 that was in the adjacent boatyard, we kindly accepted their offer for two nights, as they were due to launch the following day. We then got ourselves booked into a hotel across the water in Preveza for 10 days which I hoped would be sufficient time to get things sorted.

We found ourselves to be virtually the only guests in this family run hotel, that is until the following day when coachloads of young girls booked in ,taking part in a choral festival and could be heard at all hours practising in the corridors, Preveza is a lovely old Greek City with a fine tradition of Arts and Culture. We have previously attended several events involving the "Armonia d Preveza"

I was concerned that the provided store although it had appeared to have been made "Snake Proof" did show evidence of rodent activity, so we then scoured just about every hardware store and big supermarket buying up storage boxes with lids, and ensured everything that might be nibbled was secure.

The next week was spent going back and forth to Wild Thyme, meeting contractors and surveyor, and arranging quotes for the various work needed to bring her back to A1 condition.

As can be seen from the photos, the flood has indeed caused a great deal of damage, not only up to the water level, (all varnish below that level has blistered or lifted), but also the rest of the boat content was effected just by the extreme saturation of being closed up for several months with that amount of water inside, so all upholstery, (bunks & curtains, stored clothing) has been soiled badly. A lot of spares and tools and electrical equipment were stored in low level lockers and were ruined. Other clothing in hanging lockers is affected, all the varnished woodwork is damaged. Two out of our four battery banks were underwater, so have to be replaced including the cabling.

Very fortunately the water level stopped just short of the Volvo engine dipstick entry and thus has not entered the engine, although the starter motor and alternator are being checked, having now been removed.

Initial cleaning has been done and quotes for renovation have now been approved this week (8.06.16) and after drying out, work will start in early July in stripping/repainting insides of all lockers etc. and bilges, and varnishing every bit of wood there is a lot (Westerly used a lot of teak) All Bunk cushions curtains will be renewed, including our cockpit cushions as they were stored below for the winter. We are currently looking at dozens of cloth samples at home.

All damaged boat inventory items and our personal effects we shall be reimbursed for as we replace them.

The storage fees and the yard fees will be paid for until she is re-launched. (Hopefully September) We unfortunately have to pay for all Mechanical and Electrical work as these are NOT covered when a boat is laid up except if caused by a "Sudden Inrush of Water" ours is classed as a gradual intake of water. Still I think we have not done too badly overall.

And because we are insured via Westerly Owners Assoc. our No Claims Bonus remains intact.

Retrospectively we now know the cause of the flood.

The surveyor carried out a hosepipe test of the deck and it was found that "Wildthyme" was laid up slightly more "bows –up" than is usual, this caused rainwater to flow aft. They do suffer pretty torrential rains in the winter with a usual amount of 1m per m2. compared to about 100mm here. Some water entered via the deck anchor/winch well as it was driven to the rear of that locker and found a crack in the fibreglass permitting entry into the anchor chain locker and on into the bilges. We were however pretty sure that could not account for the volume of water and have since found another entry via a tear in the bottom front apron of the sprayhood directing rainwater under the main hatch garage and coaming, which apparently one or other of the deck fixings has become loose.

We are flying out to Greece shortly to remove and refit the complete hatch garage and sprayhood coaming to ensure this cannot re-occur. We shall also ensure in future that when she is laid up she is exactly level.

We are very sorry to have had to disappoint friends and family who were to have joined us at various times this summer, perhaps we can do it next year.

A rather comical climax on returning home though, having expected us to be away for 5 months, our youngest daughter kindly offered the use of our bungalow to store some furniture for a friend who was in desperate need, but on hearing of our imminent return managed to squeeze it all into our spare room, not sure how she managed it.

And so here we are enjoying a lovely UK summer here in Clevedon, our 1st in four years and we have just returned from a lovely woodland walk where we were very pleased to see some beautiful young Roe deer, so life is good. Hope to get down to WYC very soon.


