Treasurers Report

Easter is nearly upon us and no, my boat isn't ready yet either!

Financial year 2018 closed with the club surplus up on the year by £1,554.17 and a total cash holding of £21,350.49. Compared to surplus figures from several previous years, this was down due to significant maintenance costs. The underlying trend however, was similar to previous years with the exception of the bar which was also down by some £363.66. It would be welcome to see a reversal of this latter figure this year, particularly as further scheduled maintenance costs are likely to produce an overall negative outcome.

Headline figures at the moment reflect our annual routine of early heavy outgoings followed by subscriptions gradually redressing the balance:

Club Maintenance

We have finally agreed on how to refurbish the exterior of the clubhouse. In early June, a team will be doing a form of rendering - 'K Rend' for anyone interested.

The rusted beads around windows and doorframes will be removed and the walls prepared and treated prior to a mesh being bonded to the walls and then a skim of coloured render.

The work should be completed in less than 2 weeks and there will still be access to the Galley, toilets & showers through the rear door, same as at present.


However, we will have to remove the 4 x power points on the outside of the club during the work and they will be replaced with new power outlets when the work is finished.

Greetings from Brillig

Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year 2019 To All our friends from Brillig

Rika's retired from hand washing in 2019, YEAH!!

In 2018, Andrew and I spent lots of time separately and Brillig didn't make many miles under her keel – only 150NM in 47hours from Alvor Algarve to Cascais on Tejo.

Until spring, Andrew was painting at friend's house in Alcoutim on Rio Guadiana then we planned to return to the UK; dealing with the house, hauling-out Brillig in summer and sailing back to Iberia before winter. It seemed too many activities for such a short period of time, thoughtfully we changed the plan that Andrew flew and sorted the house out and Rika stayed on board. Where can be suitable? We came and went up Rio Tejo to see our Portuguese friends and to be calm and quiet anchorage.



It was a good summer in the UK and in Portugal Rika experienced a week of over 40°c, managing with dipping in cool water and flushing water on decks. Andrew was busy emptying out the house, looking for properties in North Devon, Rika was developing Japanese music on her keyboard. Having dealt with the house for 3 years, Andrew hasn't been able to paint pictures properly, we couldn't leave Europe, either. Responsibility is heavy on us, very frustrating.



After Rika's performances, we left the village in early October. Unfortunately our engine (1972 Mr.Sabb Norwegian) was dying; the main bearing was worn out, making wining noise and when runs we saw spilt oil and the gear lever went too much ahead and jammed up. We must replace a new one, it's sad to say good-bye to Mr.Sabb he made many many miles with us but it will be good for Brillig's future. We put Zodiac with 2.5 HP Yamaha on Starboard side, helping to go on a winding river and anchored in Vila Franca de Xira – a half way to Lisbon. This was a town very hot with bull fighting; for a week every morning at the end of October we saw black bulls on street, people poked, provoked to make them run. Here we had storms, torrential rain with gusts, we spent days on board.

Needing new engine, we sailed down the river to Seixal in early November; it was a perfect sailing with North Westerly all the way to the anchorage. Andrew sensitively used Yamaha only crossing bridges. At Seixal channel, 3 ferries passed making huge wakes but we were still sailing. This made us pleased.



Seixal is an estuary of Tagus River, across Lisbon and it was

one of few cities in Portugal under power of communist party for over 20 years. There are tidal mills to grind wheat and maize and a factory which salting and drying Bacalhau are still in the bay. Nowadays, Fish is salted and dried in Norway, shipped to Portugal and more expensive. It was here Vasco da Gama and his brother Paulo had their ships built and sailed for Portuguese Discoveries. Brillig is on a municipal mooring for 3 months to be secure in winter months. In spring, we want to haul-out to put a new engine in at Tagus Yacht Centre.

Selling the house is our turning point; security arrives or our old age. Hopefully 2019 will be more exciting and interesting year with exhibitions and cruising for us.
