

When you access the page for the first time, you have to click on the **+join group** button to become a member of the group.

It was certainly a demonstration that being female is no barrier to what can be achieved.

A different kind of sailing

I'm a bit short on material for this newsletter, (and a picture helps to fill up a page), so I'm going to indulge myself and make no apology for being a huge fan of Alex Thompson. If you haven't heard of him, he is probably the UK's top ocean sailor who has competed in all of the world's most challenging ocean races like the Vendee Globe single handed round the world race and the two handed Jaques Varbre transatlantic race. He has almost always been at the front of fleets but somehow had exceptionally bad luck and not won any of the events. In the 2016/17 Vendee Globe race he hit a submerged object and broke one of his foils so was only competitive on one tack, yet still finished 2nd. In this year's Jaques Varbre Transatlantic race he again managed to find an underwater object which damaged the keel so badly it had to be cut away and the yacht had to be sailed very, very cautiously to the nearest landfall in the Cape Verde island. However Alex has been very successful in breaking records :-

2007 Monohull (up to 60') **24-hour distance record** with Andrew Cape: 501.3 nautical miles 2012: Monohull (up to 60') **Singlehanded Transatlantic sailing record**: 8 days 21 h 8 min 31 sec 2017: **Monohull singlehanded 24-hour distance record**: 536.8 nautical miles 2018: **Route du Rhum** IMOCA60 Class: 11 days 23 h 10 min 58 sec

The next Vendee Globe starts in 2020 in what are known as IMOCA 60 class yachts. These are at the forefront of yacht design and almost all have adopted 'foils' to lift the hull out of the water to reduce drag and reach speeds up to 40 knots. These 60' race boats are so far removed from what we know as yachts, it's almost as if they have come from another planet.

The picture below is the latest version Alex Thompson's 'Hugo Boss' on trials and doing 30+ knots.
